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## FIRST-EVER DJJ SERT TEAM GRADUATES AT MILAN YDC

5 men and women receive special tactical training to manage noncompliant youth —

(Milan, Ga.) --- Georgia Department of Juvenile Justice Commissioner L. Gale Buckner today announced that the Department's first-ever Security Emergency Response Team (SERT) completed their extensive training on managing non-compliant youth in day-to-day facility operations.

The SERT staff also received advanced training in cell extractions, chemical munitions and special escorts and transports, offender searches, interview and interrogation techniques and security threat groups. DJJ plans to establish SERT teams at all 26 secure facilities throughout the state.

"These SERT teams enhance DJJ's ability to protect staff and youth, and deal with difficult situations safely, quickly and effectively," said DJJ Commissioner L. Gale Buckner. "We at DJJ take seriously our mission to both protect the public and operate facilities and programs that are constitutionally safe for both youth and staff while ensuring that youth take responsibility for their actions and chart a course toward a more productive life."
